Catalog Course Description (include prerequisites): SPAN 1412 Spanish II: Four credit hours. Five contact hours. Basic Spanish language skills in listening, speaking, reading, and writing within a cultural framework. Students will acquire the vocabulary and grammatical structures necessary to communicate and comprehend at the beginner level.

Other Description: Five hours of lecture, instruction and guided drill are provided online each week. The course continues the study of Spanish grammar, Hispanic cultures and the background for conversation in a wide range of social, travel and business situations. Prerequisite: Span 1411 or approval of instructor.

Portions of this course will be managed by Blackboard; other portions will be controlled and presented by the textbook publisher's website called the Supersite. So, please get used to looking at both for the various activities which comprise this course. Blackboard can be accessed at the NTCC Portal. You are likely used to using it already. The Supersite can be acquired at vhlcentral.com.

THE SUPERSITE CODE: SETTING UP YOUR Vista Higher Learning ACCOUNT

This class requires technology access, both through NTCC's Blackboard and the SUPERSITE, the publisher's delivery system for on-line instruction. This access allows you to complete and submit assignments and tests; access all media and study tools and receive announcements. NOTE: Only buy the book from the NTCC Bookstore which includes the required Supersite code! You will find it in an envelope inside the front cover of your text.

You will spend more money if you purchase the textbook and code separately. New textbooks purchased at the NTCC bookstore will include this code. Most books that are sold online or in used condition DO NOT include the access code. Make sure that what you are buying includes the code. Without the code, the book is worthless.

The Web Site for VISTA Higher Learning, the publisher of our textbook is vhlcentral.com. That is your first stop prior to using your account code (envelope inside cover of text) and placing yourself into the appropriate class....the one you registered for (Span 1412 online). Please read the handout in Blackboard related to the Supersite and how to access it. Then register in the appropriate class (Span 1412 online) and school (Northeast Texas Community College) accordingly.

Recommended Reading(s): Spanish/English dictionary of your choice. I recommend a pocket size dictionary for travel but a larger version is handy to have in a study environment.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

- 1. Engage in conversations using level-appropriate grammatical structures including narrating events that take place in the present and past and producing questions and responses on a variety of topics dealing with everyday life.
- 2. Demonstrate understanding of level-appropriate spoken Spanish.
- 3. Write simple sentences and organize them into short paragraphs.
- 4. Read and comprehend level-appropriate texts.
- 5. Identify and discuss traditions, customs and values of the Hispanic world.
- 6. Compare and contrast the traditions, customs, and values of the Hispanic world with characteristics of their own culture.

BLACKBOARD: Blackboard delivers handouts, the syllabus, and tracks your scores as we go through the course. The main page of the Blackboard is really a calendar which will help you keep up to date. SUPERSITE also has a calendar aspect, in that it will show deadline dates when exercises and Quizzes are due to be SUBMITTED to the instructor. The instructor will update the Blackboard grade book soon after each lesson is finished. He will manually post your grades from the Supersite. Check your scores on Blackboard for your progress in the course. REMIND (see below) will be used to keep you informed and up to date. Email will likewise serve to communicate various kinds of information.

SUPERSITE: The Supersite will deliver and manage much of the course including additional textbook information, grammar exercises, practice tests, tutorials, a video specific to each Lesson, and the assessments, the tests, which are called quizzes. To practice the assignments click on CONTENT at the top of the page. Then click on ACTIVITIES and go to the appropriate Lesson, find the dated exercises, do them and submit them.

QUIZZES: To take a test or a quiz, click on ASSESSMENTS under CONTENT, find the correct Lesson, then find the dated quiz, do it, and submit it. There is one Vocabulary Quiz, 4 Grammar Quizzes, and one General Test for each Lesson. Be sure to DO YOUR OWN WORK. Do not use a translation device or get help from a friend. It will be obvious. If the instructor suspects collusion of any kind he may require that you take all future Quizzes in a monitored or proctored environment at your expense.

USE OF ACCENTS AND CORRECT SPELLING:

The Supersite ACTIVITIES and the ASSESSMENTS or QUIZZES require a great deal of precision. The accents must be correct and spelling must be accurate, including capitalization. The program expects that each sentence will start with a capital letter and end with appropriate punctuation. For purposes of completeness and precision, ALWAYS write COMPLETE sentences. The rules are the same as in English. These are necessary components of an academic Spanish course. Be sure to read the handout on accenting on the Blackboard before you attempt the exercises.

PERSONAL PROJECT: Each student will complete a personal project related to the study of the Spanish language and/or cultures approved by the instructor. The project shall include a paper of 3-4 pages, typewritten, double spaced. Footnotes and a Works Cited page are not required. Just research your topic and explain what you learned in your OWN words. Examples are Pamplona: Running of the Bulls; famous soccer stars, singers, actors; a country or region; Latino holidays or historical events; history of a local Hispanic family (maybe yours). The project may be in Spanish or English. The instructor has given you a list of approved subjects on Blackboard. Of course, you may select your own topic of personal interest for the project. Actually, I prefer that you do.

Choose your topic early and let me know by February 22. The rough draft is due March 22. The written project is due on April 12.

The project must be based on YOUR original thoughts, not simply material you copied from the Internet. Think beyond the usual topics; come up with your own ideas.

REMIND: Text messaging to individual student or the entire class. Register in REMIND by texting message (@34kdeh) to this number, 81010. All set. I will never know your phone number. Totally safe, from that perspective.

Tests/Exams:

Assessments (tests) will occur during (Grammar Quizzes) and at the end of each chapter (Lesson Quiz) on the Supersite. There will be one Vocabulary test per lesson (for Practice), four grammar quizzes per lesson and one unit test per lesson for a grade on the Supersite. For each lesson the top 3 Grammar Quizzes will be averaged to determine your grade related to grammar for that lesson. We will complete six lessons in this course. Go to the Supersite menu page and click on CONTENT. Then click on ASSESSMENTS. Find the lesson. Attempt the Vocabulary Test (Practice) and the four Grammar Quizzes and the one Lesson test by the deadlines for a grade. There is NO final exam in this course. Once you begin a Quiz, you must be prepared to finish it within the time allowed, usually one hour.

Assignments:

The grammar practice will be accomplished with exercises on the Supersite. Go to CONTENT and click on Activities. This is where you can practice a grammar point. All the various PRACTICE exercises together are worth 50 points per lesson. I will simply give you all the points if you attempt and complete the posted exercises, no matter what score you actually get on them. You will get credit for trying. These exercises will prepare you for the quizzes. On Grammar Quizzes I will drop the lowest of the 4 grades per lesson and average the 3 remaining grades for that Lesson.

DISCUSSIONS: There are four opportunities for you to discuss topics with the instructor and the other students. Please do those as scheduled. They are worth 50 points each.

BioSig-ID

NTCC is using Biometric Signature ID in all online classes to verify the student submitting work is the one enrolled in the class. Beginning the second week of classes, upon entering an online class, all students will have to enter their passcode.

Other Course Requirements:

Dates and deadlines are critical in the Supersite portion of the course. Make sure you keep up with the work. Study the textbook and work in the Supersite every single day. Do not put it off. Things do happen to all of us. We get behind...the internet goes down; so, we cannot get the assignment done on time. Learning a new language is a cumulative process. Practice every day.

Student Responsibilities/Expectations:

Be diligent in your daily study time. Submit work on time. Practice until you understand a point, then move on. Use the Supersite videos, tutorials, and other aids. The Supersite has tutorial presentations on each grammar point, flash cards and a multitude of other helps for the student. Find them and use them.

HOW TO KEEP THE "A" YOU STARTED THE COURSE WITH:

A synopsis of the parameters of this course.....what you must do.

- 1. Register your code into the Supersite and get used to that delivery system early.
- 2. Check into the Blackboard and the Supersite every day. Work ahead on practice assignments.
- 3. Do the discussions. Get involved. Get to know the other members of the class.
- 4. Do the practice exercises daily. Be ready for the quizzes, the tests. Watch tutorials.
- 5. Take the Vocab quiz (for Practice), 4 Grammar quizzes and the one Lesson quiz for each lesson.
- 6. When you sit down to take a Quiz, be prepared to finish it. Supersite will not let you leave and return.
- 7. Register for REMIND, which allows me to send you or the class quick text messages to your phone.
- 8. Prepare a personal project; research the topic, write a short paper on your subject.
- 9. There is a mid-term event in this course. You will need to video yourself completing an exercise.
- 10. Send me a short video describing what interested you most about your personal project.

NOTE: Collusion, cheating, or using a translation device on the Supersite Tests is STRICTLY prohibited: On the Supersite Tests, it is easy to cheat, get help from a friend, or otherwise take advantage of the situation. It is quickly obvious that one is using special helps. Believe me, it really is easy. The instructor has the option to have you complete one or more of such Supersite Tests in a proctored environment. He has the option to fail you if the situation continues.

Remember to check Blackboard for messages and the Blackboard grade book to review your progress in the course. You may get reports from the Supersite related to your grade on activities, practice tests, and the actual Lesson Tests. But, I will manually transfer those Supersite grades to the Blackboard Grade Book.
