Course Description:

Finite Mathematics is a first course in finite mathematics for business majors with emphasis on applications to modern business practices. Topics to be developed include the application of common algebraic functions, including polynomial, exponential, logarithmic, and rational, to problems in business, economics, and the social sciences. The applications include mathematics of finance, including simple and compound interest and annuities; systems of linear equations; matrices; linear programming; probability, including expected value; and statistics, including normal distribution. Three hours credit.

Prerequisite(s): Appropriate TSI score / TSI placement with multiple measures.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will

- 1324.1 Apply elementary functions, including linear, quadratic, polynomial, rational, logarithmic, and exponential functions to solving real-world problems.
- 1324.2 Solve mathematics of finance problems, including the computation of interest, annuities, and amortization of loans.
- 1324.3 Apply basic matrix operations, including linear programming methods, to solve application problems.
- 1324.4 Demonstrate fundamental probability techniques and application of those techniques, including expected value, to solve problems.

1324.5 Apply statistical analyses including measures of center, measures of variation, and the normal distribution to model applications to solve real-world problems.

Core Curriculum Purpose and Objectives:

Through the core curriculum, students will gain a foundation of knowledge of human cultures and the physical and natural world; develop principles of personal and social responsibility for living in a diverse world; and advance intellectual and practical skills that are essential for all learning.

Courses in the foundation area of mathematics focus on quantitative literacy in logic, patterns, and relationships. In addition, these courses involve the understanding of key mathematical concepts and the application of appropriate quantitative tools to everyday experience.

Evaluation/Grading Policy:

A series of online Blackboard engagement opportunities including discussion forums, drop-box assignment(s), and online homework problems (MyOpenMath) will be worth 40% of your final grade. A Midterm and Final Exam will contribute to 60% of the final grade, both the Midterm and Final Exams **MUST** be proctored. If you are not able to use NTCC's Testing Center or Remote Proctor Now to take your exams you must submit a proctor form by the end of the first week of class for approval.

Homework via MOM is graded when submitted except for Show Your Work Problems (SYW) these will be graded within 72 hours **after** the due date. Discussion forums and drop-box assignment(s) are graded within 72 hours **after** the due date. The Midterm and Final Exams are graded when submitted except for completion/SYW problems, these will be grade within 72 hours **after** the due date. Blackboard will work on both a Mac and a PC. (Chrome Books are known to have issues with Blackboard.) It is best to access Blackboard through Fire-Fox or Chrome as your web browser. If you have trouble with any of the activities working properly, you might change your web browser as your first solution. The Default Browser in Windows 10 is Edge. This browser does not do well with Blackboard! If you will go to Windows Accessories you will find Internet Explorer still on your computer but is not your default browser. If you have any difficulties navigating with Edge, close it and go to Internet Explorer.

Course Structure and Overview:

This is an eight-week online course where students are required to access graded activities on the Blackboard Learning Management System. A typical class involves general participation by all members in discussions regarding mathematical principles and procedures being studied. Students are required to complete online homework, discussion forums, as well as drop-box assignments. It is very important students keep up with course materials and assignments since this is a very fast-paced course. Students are expected to watch instructional videos, read course textbook, and complete online assignments located in the Learning Management System, Blackboard by due dates.

Communications:

Emails will be responded to with 24 hours. If you do not receive a response within 24 hours, then the email was not received. Posts in the Discussion Forum "Questions, Comments, and/or Concerns?" will be monitored by the instructor. Responses by the instructor will be within 72 hours of post. Discussion Forum Math Rubric:

- 9 10: The student completes all important components of the task and communicates ideas clearly. The student demonstrates in-depth understanding of the relevant concepts and/or processes. Where appropriate, the student chooses more efficient and/or sophisticated processes. Where appropriate, the student offers insightful interpretations or extensions (generalizations, applications, analogies).
- 7-8: The student completes most important components of the task and communicates clearly. The student demonstrates understanding of major concepts even though she/he overlooks or misunderstands some less important ideas or details.
- $\underline{5-6}$: The student completes some important components of the task and communicates those clearly. The student demonstrates that there are gaps in his/her conceptual understanding.
- 3-4: Student shows minimal understanding. Student unable to generate strategy or answer may display only recall effect. Answer lacks clear communication.
- $\underline{1-2}$: Answer may be totally incorrect or irrelevant.
