Catalog Course Description (include prerequisites): Three hours credit. A study of the biological, psychological, and sociological concepts applicable to basic needs of the family including childbearing and neonatal care. Utilization of the nursing process in the assessment and management of the childbearing family. Topics include physiological changes related to pregnancy, fetal development, and nursing care of the family during labor and delivery and the puerperium. Three hours lecture and one hour lab per week. Prerequisite: Completion of VNSG 1304, VNSG 1502. Mandatory co-requisite: VNSG 1162.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- 4. Apply the curricular threads of pharmacology, nutrition, culture, communication, ethical legal concerns, and clinical reasoning/ problem solving to the care of childbearing women and neonates with normal and abnormal processes.
- 5. Collaborate with the patient and interdisciplinary team to provide for health promotion and risk reduction for childbearing women and neonates.
- 6. Use human and material resources to care for patients and families within the health care system.
- 7. Assist in the development and implementation of teaching concepts for childbearing women and families.
- 8. Utilize concepts from class to provide patient centered care to childbearing women and neonates.
