Catalog Course Description (include prerequisites): A health-related work-based learning experience that enables the student to apply specialized occupational theory, skills, and concepts. Direct supervision is provided by the clinical professional in the lecture and skills/lab environment.

The student must pass RNSG 1137, 1538 & 2363 concurrently in order to be able to progress in the nursing program.

Student Learning Outcomes:

The Texas State Board of Nurses (BON) provides differentiated essential competencies

(DECs) (2010) to guide nursing education programs in developing a curriculum which prepares graduates to provide safe, competent, compassionate care. The competencies from the BON show the expected level of performance, integrating knowledge, skills, abilities, and judgment based upon the preparation in the program of study. The differentiation is based upon the level of the nursing education program which the student is enrolled.

The NTCC nursing program director and faculty incorporate the Differentiated Essential Competencies (DECs) (2010) into the student learning outcomes of each course, based on the level of the nursing educational program. The learning outcomes of this course are based on the essential competencies of graduates of Texas Associate Degree nursing education programs. By the end of this course, the student will be able to:

1. Utilize a systematic process to analyze selected health care concepts to manage care for diverse patients across the lifespan.

2. Describe the interrelatedness between health care concepts to assist in developing clinical judgement.

3. Describe the attributes and roles of the professional nurse including leadership, management and principles of delegation.

4. Apply a systematic problem solving process for the development of clinical judgement.

5. Discuss the legal-ethical parameters for professional nursing practice including the Nursing Practice Act and the ANA Code of Ethics as related to selected exemplars.

6. Utilize professional communication techniques in providing patient-centered care and collaborating with members of the health care team.

7. Identify health promotion needs for diverse patients across the life-span.
