**Adobe Photoshop CC Plan:** You must have access to the Adobe Photoshop Creative Cloud plan to complete the assignments in this course. The plan is available for purchase by subscription at Adobe.com, and the annual plan costs \$19.99 per month paid monthly. This is student pricing, and you must provide your institutional affiliation to Adobe during your purchase transaction.

NTCC has an Adobe Creative Cloud site license, and the software is available on NTCC computer labs in the Learning Commons.

You can also download a free trial of the Adobe Photoshop for 30 days. You will need access to Photoshop throughout the entire semester, though. If you have any concerns or

The required textbook includes access to the required course materials at Peachpit and is **NOT** the Photoshop program. You must have **the required textbook and Photoshop CC plan** to complete this course.

To complete the required Classroom in a Book exercises, you must create a Peachpit account and download the image files from their website. See the textbook introduction pages in the front of the textbook for information about how to do this.

# **Student Learning Outcomes:**

#### **Lectures & Discussions:**

Discussions and projects are outlined on Blackboard by week. Specific information about each project will be posted in the weekly Blackboard folder for that week

Begin the class by logging in to Blackboard and finding the START HERE folder.

- Read the syllabus and complete the syllabus acknowledgement test.
- Establish a Bio Sig by the end of the first week; instructions are in the START HERE folder.
- Create an Adobe.com account, purchase Adobe Photoshop and install Adobe Photoshop CC
- Create a Peachpit account and download Peachpit lesson files.

### Listed below is an outline of the assignments and tasks for the course:

Week 1: Introductions (25 points), Syllabus, Bio Sig, Blackboard, Photoshop CC Overview, Peachpit. Discussion #1 (25 points) in Blackboard, syllabus acknowledgment in Blackboard. See Week 1 in Blackboard for specific details. DUE DATE: Sep 2

Week 2: Copyright Rules & Project Management. Read handout and watch related videos. Take quiz #1 on Copyright Rules & Project Management. Complete Chapter 1 – Getting to Know the Work Area & upload assignment as psd (50 points). See Week 2 in Blackboard for specific details. DUE DATE: Sep 9

*Week 3:* Complete Chapter 2 – *Basic Photo Corrections* & upload assignment as psd (50 points). See Week 3 in Blackboard for specific details. Review design elements & principles handout on Blackboard. Watch two videos on design elements & principles. DUE DATE: Sep 16

Week 4: Complete Chapter 3 – Working with Selections & upload assignment as psd (50 points). See Week 4 in Blackboard for specific details. DUE DATE: Sep 23

*Week 5:* Complete Chapter 4 – *Layer Basics &* upload assignment as psd (50 points). Do extra credit on page 104 (25 points). See Week 5 in Blackboard for specific details. Create thread in Discussion #2 (25 points). DUE DATE: Sep 30

- Week 6: Complete Chapter 5 Quick Fixes & upload assignments as psd (10 pointsx7=70 points total).
- *Week 7:* Complete Chapter 6 Masks & Channels & upload assignment as psd (50 points). Create a postcard.
- Week 8: Complete Chapter 7 Typographic Design & upload assignment as psd (50 points). Change "games" to "gamings" on page 173, and change "music" to "memes" on page 174. Complete midterm terminology exam.
- Week 9: Complete Chapter 8 Vector Drawing & upload assignment as psd (50 points). On page 202, add a text layer with your legible signature in the lower right corner using the same red as the word Koffee.
- Week 10: Complete Chapter 9 Advanced Compositing & upload assignment as psd (50 points). On page 220, instead of using the provided background, find a suitable copyright-free background (maybe try Unsplash or Pixabay), or even an image you took. In the comments on Blackboard, tell me where you got the image. Discussion #3 is due.
- Week 11: Complete Chapter 10 Painting with the Mixer Brush & upload two assignments as psd (25 points each = 50 points). Go to page 345 and add the Kyle Webster brushes to your Photoshop.
- Week 12: Complete with Chapter 12 Working with Camera Raw & upload two assignments (25 points each = 50 points).
- *Week 13:* Chapter 13 Preparing Files for the Web. Post 3 assignments: p. 322 galleries, p. 325 artboard, and page 330 both boards. Discussion #4 is due.
- *Week 14:* Chapter 14 Producing & Printing Consistent Color. Printing is NOT required, but suggested.
- Week 15: Final Project Creative Project 150 points
- Week 16: (Finals Week) Final Project Due Dec 9 by midnight

- projects see the weekly project list above for the possible points for each project. Your project grades will be posted in your gradebook in Blackboard.
