Catalog Course Description (include prerequisites): Health Occupations students are preparing themselves for entry-level placement in Health Care, including Nursing Assisting certification with the State of Texas. Program contents includes Anatomy and Physiology, Path physiology and Medical Terminology. Students are trained in nurse assisting skills utilizing the OBRA 1991 guidelines, and may apply for certification after completion of the required clinical hours provided by the program. As time permits, students will also be trained in advanced care patient assisting skills.

Students are trained in advanced CPR skills and First Aid with certification in the American Heart Association BLS for Health Care Providers and National Safety Certification.

Prerequisites to admission into the CNA Program include:

- 1. Negative TB Test
- 2. Current CPR License
- 3. Required Vaccinations

Skills are either a Pass/Fail status. Clinical skills as stated under Clinical guidelines must meet 100% proficiency in the nursing skills to meet State Requirements.

In essence, a parent has no legal right to obtain information concerning the child's college records without the written consent of the student. Directory information is defined as: the student's name, permanent address and/or local address, telephone listing, dates of attendance, most recent previous education institution attended, other information including major, field of study, degrees, awards received, and participation in officially recognized activities/sports.

Other Course Policies: CNA EXAM INFORMATION

Any person with a Felony Record, or conviction involving child/adult abuse, and/or neglect, assault, battery or theft will require permission from the board prior to testing.

Criminal Background Checks are required in Texas for all persons going into a health care career/job.

To sit for the exam:

- All skills must be passed to take the CNA exam.
- Core curriculum exams must be passed with 75%.
- Clinical hours must be completed successfully.

Upon completion of the program, a Certificate will be issued, which will allow you to take the exam. You will receive a packet of study materials to assist you in preparing for the test. Be sure and read the materials over thoroughly. You will be trained according to the testing guidelines.

You are encouraged to take the exam as soon as possible upon completion of the program to ensure positive outcomes. The longer you wait, the less likely that you will pass.
