CLASS PARTICIPATION:

In-Class Meetings vs Blackboard Meetings

This is a hybrid format class, meaning that 1 class meeting per week will be held face-to-face with the instructor, and one will be delivered through the NTCC Blackboard environment. It is important that the student understands that the Blackboard sessions and corresponding assignments are equally as important as the in-class instruction. Failure to participate in Blackboard classes or assignments will count as an absence in the same way as missing a face-to-face class. Additionally, testable material will be derived from the Blackboard and in-class instruction equally. It is the individual student's responsibility to access and complete the on-line portion of this course, prior to coming to class each week.

TESTS/EXAMS:

Final Exam: December 13, 2017 (Monday – Thursday)

This course consists of four exams, two quizzes, a mid-term, and a final. The mid-term will consist of information from the start of the semester, up to the time of the exam. The final will be comprehensive and contain information from the entire course. **If you have a conflict with the exam dates**, you <u>must</u> contact the instructor prior to the exam week to attempt to resolve the conflict in a mutually agreeable manner.

Assignments:

BLACKBOARD ASSIGNMENTS:

There will be eleven Blackboard assignments that will be completed during this course. **Each** assignment varies in length and complexity. All necessary materials and direction will be provided by the instructor through the Blackboard system. Students are expected to fully participate in all on-line exercises as they will be a significant source of testing material for both quizzes and major exams.

BLACKBOARD DISCUSSION ITEMS:

There will be four Blackboard Discussion questions that will be completed during this course. Blackboard discussions will be aimed at expanding the students understanding of the presented material by providing real-world examples of the topics covered in class. Blackboard discussions will be treated just as an in-class discussion would be and participation will be graded as such. Therefore, while completing the minimum requirements for post and responses will earn a passing grade, only active and meaningful participation and effort will result in an A+ level score.

The instructor reserves the right to modify the topics to be covered in order to best prepare the student with the above stated learning outcomes.

Student Responsibilities/Expectations:

Class Attendance: Participation in class discussions and assignments is mandatory. Students' participation grade (50 points of the total Class Grade) will be <u>heavily based</u> on in-class engagement.

Withdrawal requests <u>MUST BE</u> initiated by the student. The last day for a student to drop a course with a grade of "W" is **Tuesday**, **October 13**, **2017**. Requests for withdrawal become official and effective the date they are received in the records office. Students who stop coming to class but fail to drop the course will <u>earn</u> an "F" for the course.

Late Work: To be considered "on time," all work must be submitted at the beginning of class on the day that it is due. Assignments can be submitted for a 10% deduction for one week following the assignment due date. If there are extenuating circumstances, please contact your instructor.
