Catalog Course Description:

A general introduction to the visual arts designed to create an appreciation of the vocabulary, media, techniques, and purposes of the creative process. Students will critically interpret and evaluate works of art within formal, cultural, and historical contexts.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

- 1. Apply art terminology as it specifically relates to works of art.
- 2. Demonstrate knowledge of art elements and principles of design.
- 3. Differentiate between the processes and materials used in the production of various works of art.
- 4. Critically interpret and evaluate works of art.
- 5. Demonstrate an understanding of the impact of arts on culture.

Lectures & Discussions: This is a minimester travel course. The face-to-face lectures and discussions will occur as we visit museums and travel around Boston. Boston MA has a rich history, diverse population, and dynamic presence. NTCC travel courses are conducted by faculty who are experienced travelers and who are experts in their field. These travel courses allow you to experience another culture in an immersive experience. You will be interacting with your classmates and instructor through discussions and critiques. LearnSmartAssignments, via Connect by McGraw-Hill, and corresponding due dates are listed in the course schedule in the START HERE folder.

Other Course Requirements: This is a travel course and our "classroom" will be the museums and architecture on the streets of Boston. Be respectful of your surroundings and the people you encounter. Faculty-led travel courses are an exciting and very enriching way to study. You will complete Blackboard assignments via Connect to learn about art appreciation through readings and LearnSmart coursework; then you'll travel to Boston to enhance your learning. You will critique and analyze works of art within formal, cultural, and historical contexts.

The Blackboard Learning Management System contains a course navigation bar and home page where you will find a Student Resource tab. Use this tab to learn more about the environment you will be working in during this course. You must work wisely and diligently to be successful in this course as it has the same rigor and expectations as in a traditional 16-week art appreciation course. Computer Requirements: You must have access to a computer to take this course. Your computer needs to have Windows XP SP3 or later or MAC OS X10.3 or higher. You will need broadband internet access. You can check your operating system by right clicking on the My Computer icon on the home screen

Student Responsibilities/Expectations:

1. You must complete online assignments promptly and before the due date. No late work is accepted.

2. Read all Blackboard announcements as they are posted.

3. You must check NTCC email and Blackboard daily.

4. You must monitor YOUR GRADES in Blackboard and contact me if you have ANY questions.

5. Withdrawal Policy: It is your responsibility to drop a course or withdraw from the college. Once you have submitted the syllabus acknowledgment, you are considered in attendance.
