Course Description

ECON 2301 Macroeconomics (three semester hours)

This course, Macroeconomics, is an analysis of the economy as a whole including measurement and determination of Aggregate Demand and Aggregate Supply, national income, inflation, and unemployment. Other topics include international trade, economic growth, business cycles, and fiscal policy and monetary policy. Macroeconomics and current economic topics are emphasized.

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Course Rationale

This course, Macroeconomics, is an introduction to the study of general economic principles. Such topics as economic systems, demand and supply, business organizations, gross domestic product, unemployment, inflation, fiscal policy, monetary policy, interest rates, and business cycles are discussed. Macroeconomics and current economic topics are emphasized.

Course Objectives

Upon successful completion of Economics 2301, students will:

- 1. Explain the role of scarcity, specialization, opportunity cost and cost/benefit analysis in economic decision-making.
- 2. Identify the determinants of supply and demand; demonstrate the impact of shifts in both market supply and demand curves on equilibrium price and output.
- 3. Define and measure national income and rates of unemployment and inflation.
- 4. Identify the phases of the business cycle and the problems caused by cyclical fluctuations in the market economy.
- 5. Define money and the money supply; describe the process of money creation by the banking system and the role of the central bank.
- 6. Construct the aggregate demand and aggregate supply model of the macro economy and use it to illustrate macroeconomic problems and potential monetary and fiscal policy solutions.
- 7. Explain the mechanics and institutions of international trade and their impact on the macro economy.
- 8. Define economic growth and identify sources of economic growth.

Course Assignment Procedures

Assessment/Evaluation and Grading:

There will be 2 exams, 1 project, 1 discussion question, 5 quizzes and exercises and problems for each chapter. These graded items will be completed according to the course schedule in Blackboard.

Exams:

Exams will include 50 multiple-choice questions and each question is worth 5 points. No exam grades will be dropped. The exams will be timed (1.5 hours). Please see the course schedule attached to this syllabus for specific dates. For security purposes, you will be required to download a lockdown browser on your computer prior to testing so that you may not visit any other websites while taking your exam.

Project:

Please remember: You should focus on a <u>macroeconomic issue occurring within a foreign</u> <u>country</u> that you want to learn more about. There are plenty of topics to choose from and frame your question around, but you need to make sure you discuss something of macroeconomic significance. The topic that you choose should be researched thoroughly, analyzed critically and submitted as a <u>POWERPOINT OR GOOGLE SLIDES PRESENTATION</u> via the appropriate assignment link in Blackboard. There is no required number of slides as you just need to make sure you cover your topic effectively.

You must submit your country and topic choice via the appropriate assignment link in Blackboard by the assigned due date (see due date on syllabus or in BB). Once you have submitted your topic selection, I will reply with my approval or a request for you to select something different. This topic approval assignment is not part of your grade but does issue you a point value only to show that you completed it. You must receive approval before beginning your work. Any presentations submitted without prior approval will not be graded and will receive a grade of zero.

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Please remember that your textbook is an excellent resource for specific guidance to topic selection. Remember that this project should be <u>your own work</u>—plagiarism (taking someone else's work or ideas and passing them off as one's own) will not be tolerated. Copying from another source and using block quotations from another source is not representative of your own work. Please use reputable internet websites; **do NOT utilize any Wikipedia or comparable citations.** There is no need to cite within the slides, but make sure and include a works cited page at the end. Failure to include a works cited slide detailing where you found your material will result in an F.

Please review the college policy and the course syllabus for details regarding academic honesty.

This final project is worth 200 points toward your grade and is due on the last week of the course (see specific due date on syllabus or within BB). Late projects will receive a 10% point deduction for each day late up to 3 days. After that, no projects will be accepted.

Your project will be graded on the following criteria:

- -relevance of topic
- -thorough analysis and delivery
- -creativity of topic selection and title
- -grammar and formatting.

Online Discussion:

You have 1 online discussion question for this course and it should be completed during week 1 as this relates directly to this course syllabus. No peer replies are required.

Chapter Assignments:

There are 11 chapter assignments that are to be completed in Blackboard. Each assignment is worth between 15 and 20 points and the lowest chapter assignment score will be dropped at the end of the term. The assignments can be submitted for credit no later than the assigned due date at midnight. **No late work will be accepted.** The answers to all graded assignments will be posted immediately following the due date. See course schedule below for specifics.

Quizzes:

There are 5 multiple choice quizzes that are to be completed in Blackboard. These are related to your chapter material and each quiz has 20 questions and is worth 20 points. You have 2 attempts on each quiz and the highest grade will be counted. There is a 30 minute time-limit for each quiz. All quizzes must be taken within the assigned time frame and no late quizzes will be accepted. *There is no proctoring requirement for the quizzes.*

In addition to adding points to your course grade, these quizzes are great practice for the exams but <u>please do not use them as your only study tool.</u> The homework questions and problems will also be represented on your exams and these short quizzes cannot possibly cover all of that material. So, these quizzes are merely a "sample" of what the test questions might look like and

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not reflective of everything that you will be tested on. All quiz answers will be released to you after the due date passes. See course schedule below for specific due dates.

Late Work Policy:

Please allow yourself an appropriate amount of time to complete the coursework. Students who wait until the last minute often miss the deadline and then cannot receive credit for their work. All due dates for the entire course are included with this syllabus so you can work as far ahead as you would like. 
