**Course Description:** 3 credit hours.

Lecture/Lab/Clinical: Three hours of class each week.

A course that is open to all students. It is designed to acquaint the student with types of drama, the theatre's historical developments, stage terms, and styles of acting and the functions of its various personnel.

Class Description: Welcome to Theatre History I! This course is a survey of Theatre History from its' inception, through 5<sup>th</sup> Century B.C. Greece, The Roman Period, The Middle Ages, The Spanish Renaissance and the Elizabethan Period. The course is open to all interested students and fulfills the Visual and Performing Arts requirement for graduation at Northeast Texas Community College. Major focus of the class will be centered on the playwrights and their plays from the historical periods studied. Upon successful completion of this class, you will be able to identify and understand basic theatre terminology, be knowledgeable of the major playwrights and their representative works from 5<sup>th</sup> Century B.C. through the 1600's, and have a greater appreciation of all art forms and manners of artistic expression.

# **Required Textbook(s):** Theatre History I: Package from NTCC Bookstore

### **Upon successful completion of this course, students will:**

- 1. Analyze the history of theater through written responses to historic texts, artifacts, and performance practices.
- 2. Identify essential terminology related to the history of theater.
- 3. Evaluate current productions of historical plays through an understanding of their original production conditions.
- 4. Evaluate the interaction between theater and society.

# **Course Objectives:**

It is expected that through your active participation in this class that you will:

- 1. become more proficient in the assessment, development, and application of your creative abilities;
- 2. be able to identify basic theatre terminology;
- 3. have a good foundation of knowledge regarding the lives and works of representative playwrights from antiquity to the Elizabethans;
- 4. have a greater appreciation for the varied and significant artistic contributions from cultures different than our own.

### **CLASS ATTENDANCE:**
