This course consists of two exams, a mid-term, and a final. The mid-term will consist of information from the start of the semester, up to the time of the exam. The final will be comprehensive and contain information from the entire course. **If you have a conflict with the exam dates**, you <u>must</u> contact the instructor prior to the exam week to attempt to resolve the conflict in a mutually agreeable manner.

QUIZZES:

There will be 2 quizzes for this course. Each quiz will be a mixture of multiple choice and short answer questions. Each quiz will be worth a total of 100 points of your total class grade.

Missed quizzes must be made up before the next quiz date. Failure to make up a quiz will result in a 0 score for that assignment.

Assignments:

IN-CLASS ASSIGNMENTS:

There will be four in-class assignments that will be completed during this course. **Each assignment will be worth ten points of the students' overall grade.** All necessary materials and direction will be provided by the instructor on the day of the assignment. Students are expected to fully participate in all in-class exercises as they will be based on practical skills of Criminal Investigation and are necessary for complete understanding of course material.

Should a student be absent on the day of an in-class assignment, a 1-2 page, type-written paper covering the topic of the in-class exercise may be turned in to replace the assignment grade.

Students will only be allowed to make up 2 in-class assignments in this format.

Homework Assignments:

There will be four independent homework assignments throughout the course. Each assignment will be worth 40 points of the student's total grade. Students are expected to work independently on homework assignments and to not share their work with classmates. Each assignment will consist of a practical exercise and a record of the students' observations. All homework assignments will be type-written, double spaced #12 font, and formatted to fit the particular assignment.

The instructor reserves the right to modify the topics to be covered in order to best prepare the student with the above stated learning outcomes.

Student Responsibilities/Expectations:

Class Attendance: Participation in class discussions and assignments is mandatory. Students' participation grade (100 points of the total Class Grade) will be <u>heavily based</u> on in-class engagement.

Withdrawal requests <u>MUST BE</u> initiated by the student. The last day for a student to drop a course with a grade of "W" is **Thursday**, **April 13**, **2017**. Requests for withdrawal become official and effective the date they are received in the records office. Students who stop coming to class but fail to drop the course will <u>earn</u> an "F" for the course.

Late Work: To be considered "on time," all work must be submitted at the beginning of class on the day that it is due. Assignments can be submitted for a 10% deduction for one week following the assignment due date. If there are extenuating circumstances, please contact your instructor.

Directory information is defined as: the student's name, permanent address and/or local address, telephone listing, dates of attendance, most recent previous education institution attended, other information including major, field of study, degrees, awards received, and participation in officially recognized activities/sports.
